DATA SERVICES: WHO'S WHO, WHAT'S WHAT...

With the recent addition of Lisa Zilinski as Data Services Specialist, the Research Department is now called Research and Data Services (which you will soon notice when the new web design is complete). I've heard a few people ask how Zilinski's position differs from Jake Carlson's since they have the same title. She is here to coordinate a program of data services, ensuring that common research data reference and related services can be handled consistently. In other words, she is helping to operationalize data services by making sure we all have the skills and resources to answer questions related to research data curation and management. The goal is for everyone to become more proactive as data-related activities are integrated more and more into what the Libraries does.

In his role, Jake Carlson looks at larger problems, what are the data issues researchers have and how do we assess them so we can learn how to better interact and work with them. The Data Curation Profiles (DCP) are an example of how a big problem was looked at (who is willing to share data?) and a tool (DCP Toolkit) and a resource (DCP Directory) was developed that others can use day-to-day. Carlson helps identify things that may later become operational. He also collaborates with faculty and will start spending time in HSSEB helping to look for digital humanities opportunities.

How does [Purdue University Research Repository](#) (PURR) fit in? Courtney Matthews is PURR's repository manager, similar to David Scherer ([e-Pubs](#)) and Neal Harmeyer ([e-Archives](#)). In his role, Matthews facilitates overall use of the repository, helps recruit content for it and provides support to liaisons and researchers in using it. He works closely with Zilinski, as well as the liaisons, because some data services will result in the need to use PURR. He works with Michael Witt, who you may recall is the project director overseeing development of PURR and who works closely with ITaP/HUBzero and the Vice President for Research's (VPR) offices. Witt is also the liaison for Computer Science and Discovery Park.

This year there are four awards/scholarships available. The application deadline is **March 8, 2013**.

The PULSE Award

This award was created by the Purdue Libraries Circulation/Reserve Team in 2004. Initial funding was initiated through garage sales, a craft/bake sale and individual donations. In the first year, \$1,445.80 was raised from 40 donors. Contributions continued to be added throughout the year with the goal of reaching the \$20,000 amount necessary to endow the award. In 2004, Libraries Dean, Jim Mullins, led a fundraising challenge and agreed to match pledges from the Dean's Fund dollar for dollar. In 2005, endowment efforts were achieved with the efforts and contributions of Purdue graduates Mike and Judy Humnicky of California, who both spent their time at Purdue (1966-70) employed by the Libraries. The first two awards were presented in May 2004. This year two \$1000 awards are available.

The Dorothy Newby McCaw Scholarship

In 2004, Dorothy Newby McCaw found a meaningful way to honor her friend: she endowed the *Dorothy Newby McCaw Scholarship for Libraries Student Workers* in honor of Emily R. Mobley, former Libraries Dean. McCaw established the scholarship in honor of Dean Mobley's retirement as a way to recognize her many accomplishments during the 12 years of her deanship. The scholarship fulfilled one of Mobley's goals as Dean — to recognize top student workers in the Libraries. The first scholarship was awarded in 2007. This year one \$2000 scholarship is available.

The Dr. Albert Viton Scholarship

In 2006, Dr. Albert Viton, author and retired economist, endowed a scholarship to be awarded annually to a student employee from the Purdue University Press or the Libraries. His desire is that this scholarship will make a significant impact on students' lives and education while at Purdue. Viton became associated with the Press with the publication of his book, *The International Sugar Agreements: Promise and Reality*, in 2004. The first scholarship was awarded in 2007. This year one \$2000 scholarship is available.

Astronaut alumnus Jerry Ross donated his personal papers to the Virginia Kelly Karnes Archives and Special Collections Research Center at a reception held in his honor on Feb. 7. Ross was visiting campus to celebrate the release of his book, *Spacewalker: My Journey in Space and Faith as NASA's Record-Setting Frequent Flyer*, co-written with John Norberg and published by Purdue University Press.

Ross' collection includes mission manuals, checklists, reports, original 16-mm films and

videos taken before, during and after Shuttle launches, his blue NASA flight suit, patches, test pilot school flight helmet and several awards and plaques as well as memorabilia from his time as a student at Purdue.
